## A Message from Jeff McKay

A lot is going on in Lee District and Fairfax County this month as the Board of Supervisors continues to work on the FY2018 budget. I encourage all Lee residents to stay updated on developments by attending our upcoming Budget Town Hall, with more information below. I also encourage residents to use the Real Estate Assessment Tax Calculator at <a href="https://www.fairfaxcounty.gov/taxcalc/">www.fairfaxcounty.gov/taxcalc/</a> to better understand where every dollar and cent in the budget goes, tailored to your personal tax rate.

## Board of Supervisors Votes to Advertise a Zero Cents Increase

The Board of Supervisors voted 9-1 on February 28 against advertising a tax rate increase from the current rate of \$1.13 per \$100 of assessed value. The Board can adopt a tax rate that is lower, but not higher than the current rate when it makes amendments to the Advertised Budget on April 25. The County Executive's proposed budget would still be able to provide over \$2 billion in funding to Fairfax County Public Schools, as well as an additional \$84 million for school-related programming such as School Nurses and School Resource Officers. Residents will have an opportunity to comment on the advertised budget at my Budget Town Hall at 7 PM on March 22 at the Franconia Governmental Center, as well as the public budget hearings at the Fairfax County Government Center on April 4-6. I look forward to discussing this year's budget as a community and getting feedback as we move forward.

#### Help Prevent Illegal Dumping

If you see illegal dumping in your neighborhood, please call the Fairfax County Health Department at 703-246-2205 to report it. Illegal dumping can have widespread negative effects on plant life, pets and people. Reporting it immediately can help curb those effects and discourage the act.

#### **Potholes**

As the winter season comes to a close, we ask that residents report any potholes in their neighborhood to the VDOT Hotline, 1-800-FOR-ROAD or 1-800-367-7623, so that they may be repaired in a timely manner. Residents may also report potholes using the online VDOT complaint form at https://my.vdot.virginia.gov/



## Fairfax County 275th Anniversary



Two hundred and seventy five years ago, the land that would become Fairfax County was largely inhabited by Algonquian speaking Native Americans called the Doeg or Dongue. Fairfax County was formed in 1742 from land that was once part of Prince William County. It was named for Thomas Fairfax, 6th Lord Fairfax of Cameron (1693-1781), proprietor of the Northern Neck. The Fairfax family name is derived from the Old English phrase for "blond hair" - Faegerfeahs.

On June 17, 2017, Fairfax County will officially celebrate its 275<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Activities will be centered on the area surrounding the historic court house in central Fairfax. Special events include many performances, speakers, living history performers, encampments and historical exhibits. There's even a chance that the current Lord Fairfax, Nicholas John Albert Fairfax will make an appearance. Save the date!

The new, 6500-pound fiberglass steeple was constructed by Stealth Concealment Solutions, Inc., of North Charleston, S.C. But here is the fun part...inside the steeple is a Verizon cell tower. You can't tell from the outside, but it is in there! The new steeple, costing \$270,000, is being paid for by the communications corporation.

All are welcome. NO membership or R.S.V.P. required.


## Woman's Club of Springfield

## Trails for Youth

#### Winter Facility is a TYO Game Changer For Us and the Kids!

We began the new year and winter with a goal of providing more opportunities to kids to be active. In previous years we have provided a variety of hikes for kids to stay active during the colder months, but we felt we needed to provide more.

The kids were restless to ride, but we expected to have a typical winter - cold, snow, rain, wet trails - all obstacles to outdoor biking. So in this vein, we looked to our community partners to help us seek a temporary indoor facility that could provide a safe space for kids to play, get exercise and spin.

We asked the Greater Springfield Chamber of Commerce to help us, and they put us in touch with Federal Investment Realty Trust. I expected a conciliatory small space that wasn't being used. However, Federal Realty recognized the value of our programs and wholeheartedly agreed to help us. After looking at properties we settled on a space that used to be a bank, (which is why the kids call the space "The Vault"). Because of their support, TYO is able to provide indoor continuous, multi-day workout program opportunities through March, for kids to stay active. Has it been working you ask? You betcha!

At drop-off, one of the Moms told me her story that exemplifies how powerful and positive this program is.

First class/Week one: "My son didn't want me to sign him up, but I was tired of him sitting on the couch playing video games. So I made him come."

Week three: "You know Julie, when I come home from work, he is at the door with his clothes ready to go. He has lost weight his pants are getting big!"

Week eight: "He loves it and he is getting so thin and healthy!"

I can attest that he has built up strength and endurance, but mostly I enjoy that he laughs and has fun at every class, while sweating and working out. So yes, it is working!

TYO couldn't be successful without community business partners and the amazing volunteers who are willing to give of their time and efforts to help. TYO is tremendously grateful for Tom Mathis who provides our "Tuesday with Tom" workouts that are fun and a challenge for the kids. Coach Pat, who is willing to be creative and provide a multitude of games to help the kids spin out the time on the trainers that feel more fun than workout. And our resident mechanics who are superb in keeping all the equipment rolling properly - Mr. Ken and Mr. Randy. Plus several guest instructors - Suz teaching self-defense and Mr. Jason of World Karate Fairfax teaching Karate. It does take a village to keep kids moving and staying active, but it's worth the effort to see their self-realization of how strong and healthy they have become. They had it in them the whole time, we just helped to foster it and bring it out.

And breaking news, we just confirmed Federal Realty Investment Trust has agreed to allows us a few more months of use of the space. So, stay tuned for upcoming program offerings - wrenching classes, Trailblazer classes, more open house fun?? Stay tuned!

This indoor facility has demonstrated to us how vital it is for TYO to have a permanent "home" for year-round programming. It has changed the game for us in that our future strategic planning will include the goal of securing a permanent location so kids can get up off the couch, socialize, get healthy and transform their bodies and minds through physical activity and fun.

When we surveyed the youth and parents about this new program, 100% of the kids said they feel healthier than when we started and as one parent stated:

"TYO, for me is a great help...as it helps our children mentally and physically and [keeps them] away from bad habits. It keeps them active and busy in their daily lives."

It's our belief that as we continue to move forward, we must strive to provide the programs and opportunities the

youth of our community need to succeed to be healthy and active all year long.

## GrandInvolve Kniting Club

#### Knitting is Fun!

#### Observations from a Non-Knitter

I'd heard so much about the wildly successful knitting club at Crestwood Elementary and decided to check it out for myself. I coordinate the GrandInvolve Program which looks very different at each of the schools we are involved in and at Crestwood, there's a group of children, teachers and GrandInvolve volunteers who meet once a week on Wednesday afternoon to learn the ancient art of knitting.

I arrived a few minutes early in anticipation of the crush of youngsters who would soon be filling the large room with noise and activity. It had been several weeks since the last lessons had finished and this was a new term for the knitters. I was impressed that the teachers were so well prepared. Fifty children were expected and each newcomer had



a sandwich bag of yarn and knitting needles - courtesy of the Springfield Civic Association! Each bag had a ball of yarn and knitting needles which were already prepared for them with a row of cast stitches on the needle. With Ms. Hetty as their leader and main teacher, they had each table identified for the different levels of learners. This way, the children could begin knitting some new stitches right away if they were lucky enough to understand the directions! As soon as the end of school bell rang, children begin rushing into the cafeteria, several of them flinging their arms around the teachers who were waiting for them. Others who were new to the club came in tentatively and looked around. I noticed that the children seemed to come in groups with their friends. At one table of new-comers, there were 4 little boys - 3<sup>rd</sup> graders who had all come together from the same classroom. They were all friends and all wanted to make a wristband! The old timers had bags of projects ready to show their teachers - things they'd been working on over the holidays. Some of them had used instruction sheets and amazingly - were able to read the directions! Not be-

ing able to knit myself - I was jealous of their skills. Once the teachers had the children sorted by ability, Mrs Schmitz -4<sup>th</sup> grade teacher, gave the newcomers a quick lesson. Immediately, 30 hands were in the air - "Please help me!" The teachers were so patient! Some of the children had slipped the cast on stitches off their needles. In a short amount of time, several of the newcomers had caught on and were helping their table mates. The experienced knitters were choosing from several projects which Ms. Hetty had prepared as samples. There were bags of supplies for each project and written instructions. I was again amazed that the children could follow a pattern. When I left the room, the experienced group was knitting furiously away and only about half the newcomers had their hands in the air for help. I wished I could stay longer to assist because the teachers were clearly outnumbered by children needing help but alas - I could not help at all and the children couldn't understand that there was an adult present who didn't know how to do this knitting project!
