President's Message—Bruce Waggoner

The Springfield Civic Association (SCA) welcomes you as we enter a new era, a Springfield Renaissance, if you will. In August, the General Services Administration announced that the new headquarters for the <u>Transportation Security Administration</u> (TSA) will be built in Springfield. This Federal investment should expedite the second phase development of the Springfield Town Center, and generate more capital investment for new businesses, e.g., restaurants, grocery stores, office space, et al. The TSA will, along with the National Geo-Spatial Intelligence Agency (NGA) and Fort Belvoir, make Springfield a Federal powerhouse for employment, business investment, and prospects for prosperity. Additionally, construction has begun on the <u>St.</u> <u>James Sports & Wellness Complex</u> at 6801 Industrial Road in Springfield, one of the largest such complexes in the entire Nation.

ALDI is expanding and renovating their store in the Concord Plaza (old Fischer Hardware site) and their competitor, LIDL, has plans to raze the former Safford Dodge eyesore on Commerce Street and build a sparkling new store in 2018. The three landmark construction projects, plus the grocery store projects, will not be without their respective and combined challenges, primarily traffic flow in and out of Springfield. However, if we work in concert with County agencies the SCA can help shape the outcome by promoting our interests in the engagement and partnering with Business, Government and non-Government agencies alike. In short, the SCA must remain actively involved in Springfield's future. We intend to be players and not spectators. Indeed, the trend line looks positive for Springfield.

SCA's tradition of community activism and grass roots engagement dates back to its inception in 1953; it is alive, well, and future focused. In this spirit, two of our members have been duly recognized as first Citizens of Fairfax County for 2017-18: Diane Boughton is Lee District's "Les Dorson Award" winner, and Michele Duell is Lady Fairfax for Lee District. Such Fairfax County recognition stems from years of persistent and dedicated effort by Diane and Michele yielding positive and lasting results for the greater Community. That spirit is catching in Springfield. There is something for everyone; your talents and contributions will only make us a more vibrant community. Join us and continue the SCA tradition of shaping Springfield's future!

Supervisor McKay's Message

As you may have heard, Springfield was recently announced as the site of a future major Transportation Security Administration (TSA) facility. Their move into our area is a sure sign of our revitalization efforts succeeding, and an indicator of the strong future of the Springfield area. Both Springfield and the TSA stand to benefit a great deal from the move, no small feat. In fact, I have been working with the TSA for years hoping this day would come. TSA employees will be making use of our smart transit infrastructure and revitalized downtown, while Springfield benefits from the nearly 4000 jobs being brought to the area.

The TSA has forecast that many of their employees will be commuting from areas in Virginia that are south of Springfield. This means that employees will be ending their commutes in Springfield, freeing up space on the interstate and inside the Beltway for the rest of us. Moving jobs closer to where people live is vital to reducing congestion. Additionally, with Metro and VRE next to the site, folks who live as far away as Spotsylvania can ride VRE straight to work.

On top of the added jobs, I am very pleased to note that unlike the cancelled FBI move, the property occupied by the TSA will be taxable by the County. As Chairman of the Budget Committee for the Board of Supervisors, I am always on the lookout for ways the County can increase funding for critical programming without raising taxes on residents.

The move is a clear-cut success for Springfield, Lee District and Fairfax County, as well as the TSA. By taking advantage of Springfield's many benefits, the TSA is signaling how attractive our area is to other federal agencies and ensuring we will continue our strong relationship with the federal government into the future.



School Zone Hazards!

Before the school year began, the SCA requested and received state assistance to eliminate two utility pole hazards in the Lynbrook Elementary School zone on Backlick Rd. The Virginia State Corporation Commission demanded immediate action of the utility and telecommunication companies involved. The pole pictured had stood splintered for over one year. Another pole had multiple loose wires within reach of a child. Both hazards were successfully cleaned up within 72 hours. State Delegate Vivian Watts will be working to hold the utility companies accountable for hazards on the poles that they own. Senator Saslaw's office will be pushing for inspections.

For Lee District, Lord Fairfax went to Richard Knapp. Richard is a dedicated citizen of Fairfax County, working to reinvigorate and preserve Fairfax's past while also bettering the future of the Route 1 Corridor. This is demonstrated by his work on the Old Mount Vernon High School Reutilization Task Force and its Steering Committee, helping bring a landmark back to life. His co-chairmanship of the Embark Advisory Group has revealed a guid-ing hand in easing transit in Lee District, and his continued work with the Pinewood Lake HOA and as the Lee representative on the Southeast Fairfax Development Corporation shows dedication to his neighbors.

Michele Duell was crowned Lady Fairfax for Lee District. Michele's commitment to improving the standard of living for the residents of Lee District is standard of tiving for the residents of Lee District is hard to match. Her service with the Friends of Richard Byrd Library saw the creation of Educators' Night, a program that helps teachers get free books, while her dedication to pedestrian safety led to the installation of Fairfax County's first HAWK Signal. Her work with the Springfield Civic Associa-tion helped give a voice to residents and their needs within local government, and her active support of her FCPS neighborhered elementary schools contributed to student encichment initiatives.



Diane Boughton Receives an Award from LADACO

SCA's own Diane Boughton received the Les Dorsen Award from LADACO. Les Dorsen was an active community activist in Fairfax County. LDACO is the umbrella organization for all the civic and homeowners associations in Lee District, Fairfax County, Virginia. It serves as a local forum for the Lee District section of Fairfax Country, just as the Fairfax County Federation of Civic Associations represents the civic associations of the entire county.

In nominating Diane for this award, former SCA President, Al McAloon, wrote:

"Diane Boughton, a twenty year plus member of the Springfield Civic Association, is a "Pioneer Woman" for active involved, and responsible citizenship. She is the type of person who Mr. Jefferson stipulated as being necessary for democracy to flourish - or survive.

Ten years ago, Diane initiated a program of identifying utility box and power line poles which were either safety hazards or were eyesores in the community, often both. During this time frame, she identified, photographed and reported to the cognizant authority over 300 poles and utility boxes. Good citizen that she is, she does not terminate her involvement with the filing of an initial report: she follows through with the responsible agency until the problem has been corrected. Or else!

That her scope of civic responsibility extends beyond her backyard and civic association boundaries is evi-



denced by her reporting of such discrepancies throughout Fairfax County.

Diane does not limit her civic engagement to just utility boxes and light poles. Before the County recognized that the McMansions of the mid-nineties constituted health and safety issues, to say nothing of their being boarding houses, she was pressing the county bureaucracy and the Lee District Supervisor (successfully) to address the issue. Moreover, potholes and graffiti know their days are numbered if Diane passes by.

Diane frequently attends meetings so that she can be up-to-date on what is being proposed for her community, to pose relevant and probing questions, to meet the staffers who will be implementing the various projects and to promote staff consciousness of community concerns. She frequently volunteers for community events. Shch as Spring-field Days, and has been instrumental in the distribution of the bi-lingual flyers and pamphlets on the topics of Miss Utility awareness, Health Department information and Human Services coordination.

As did Les Dorsen, Diane Boughton looks to solve problems, not just gripe about them."
