We are very fortunate to have Lee District Supervisor Rodney Lusk as our speaker for the March 17th meeting! Supervisor Lusk has worked over the years in Land Use and has served as National Marketing Director for the Fairfax County Economic Development Authority (FCEDA). Come and hear Supervisor Lusk's vision for Lee District. Lidl celebrated its grand opening but what are the updates on TSA, Kaiser Permanente, and the Hampton Inn to be built at the corner of Backlick and Old Keene Mill? Come and find out!

Speaking of Land Use, at our March 17th general meeting, you will have an opportunity to hear about the property at 6235 Brandon Avenue, and voice your opinion. This site located just north and behind the Marriott Residents Inn is up for nomination to be developed. The property is zoned for "mixed use", meaning a



building with retail/office below and residential on upper floors. The Lee District Land Use Committee will be voting on March 23rd whether they want this property developed at this time. We want to know YOUR thoughts so that the SCA can represent YOU! Marta Morrissey is the SCA Land Use representative and does a wonderful job of representing the SCA community! Thank you, Marta!

Bringing you up to date (as of 6 March) on SB631, the bill which deals with abandoned shopping carts... The bill passed in the Senate and House of Delegates and is on its way to the governor's desk. If the governor signs it, it will then be up to the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors to decide how it will apply to Fairfax County. Special thanks go to SCA Member at Large Larry Farnsworth, who worked tirelessly on the bill; Senator Scott Surovell, who authored the bill; and to Delegates Kaye Kory and Vivian Watts, who carried the bill in the House.

If you attend the monthly CAC (Citizens Advisory Committee) meetings, you may have met Tom Oliver. Tom is a "volunteer in police service" who provides free home safety inspections for the Fairfax County Police Department. Fairfax County Budget Update

County Executive Bryan Hill presented his proposed FY2021 budget and strategic plan to the Board of Supervisors on February 25, 2020.

The proposed strategic plan will serve as a guideline to direct the more than 1,200 County-wide initiatives that serve to empower all residents to live safely, healthily, and with equal opportunity. The budget, which allocates funding for services across the County, is based on the priorities and vision set by the Board of Supervisors. The final vote on the budget will be May 5.

This year's Real Estate Tax rate is proposed to increase by \$0.03. \$0.02 for the County's General Fund and \$0.01 specifically dedicated to affordable housing. The additional penny will serve as a local funding source with the flexibility to preserve and promote affordable housing throughout the County.

The total increase in the General Fund's budget is estimated at \$159.14 million. Some of this includes the funding of police bodyworn cameras, the Diversion First program, increasing hours at the public libraries, and reducing the County's carbon footprint. There is also a Market Rate Adjustment and adherence to our pay plan for the County's employees who provide exceptional services to Fairfax.

The County Executive's proposal funds Fairfax County Public Schools (FCPS) with \$85.72 million, which is approximately 52.6 percent of the General Fund. This significant contribution is the tenth straight year the budget has increased funding to FCPS and highlights education as a top priority for the Board of Supervisors.

"This year's proposed strategic plan and budget is a positive sign that the County and Board are on the same page as the community. The budget is a success for FCPS and for expanding affordable housing to every corner of Fairfax," Chairman McKay said. "As Chairman, I am responsible for all of our residents' needs including schools, parks, libraries, public safety, and human services. I also am constantly working to balance these long-term needs with our residents' ability to pay. I am concerned that the largest increase in real estate assessment values are in our most market rate affordable communities. This exacerbates our affordable housing challenge and we must be mindful of that. I look forward to working with the community as our Board works to fine tune this proposal and pass a balanced budget on May 5."

Also included in the County Executive's proposal is a 4 percent Admissions Tax on events, one of only two taxing authorities Fairfax County has outside of property-related taxes. The revenue will serve to increase the funding of crucial Fairfax arts and cultural programs including ARTSFAIRFAX, the Fairfax Symphony, Wolf Trap, and Visit Fairfax.

Residents will be able to comment in district meetings in March and in public hearings from April 14-16.

This Spring, TYO will begin to repair and smooth out any corrections needed for the Brookfield Park Bicycle Pump Track. The census provides critical data that lawmakers, business owners, teachers, and many others use to provide daily services, products, and support for you and your community. Every year, billions of dollars in federal funding go to hospitals, fire departments, schools, roads, and other resources based on census data.

The results of the census also determine the number of seats each state will have in the U.S. House of Representatives, and they are used to draw congressional and state legislative districts.

Census Timeline-Watch Your Mail

March 12-20: An invitation to respond to the census

March 16-24: A reminder letter

If you haven't responded yet, you will receive additional notifications:

March 26-April 3: A postcard reminder

April 8-16: A reminder letter and paper questionnaire

April 20-27: A final reminder postcard before receiving a follow-up in person.

To ensure a complete and accurate count, census takers will visit residents who did not respond.

Old Keene Mill Road Transit Center News

Construction on the Springfield Multi-Use Transit Center is postponed from the previously schedule start date of March 2020 due to the additional requirements to modify construction documents that adhere to federal bidding and construction regulations. Construction is now scheduled to begin in **September-October 2020**.

As was discussed at a community meeting last fall, the Fairfax County Department of Transportation (FCDOT) has identified alternative, temporary parking for users of the existing park-and-ride lot during construction, until the new Springfield Garage is completed in the spring of 2023. The public will be notified at least two months ahead of the park and ride closure and the relocation plan for slug lines that currently operating at the Old Keene Mill commuter lot will be:

Springfield United Methodist Church - 54 commuter parking spaces.

<u>Springfield Town Center Frontier Garage</u> - 800 commuter parking spaces on the 2nd, 4th and 6th level parking areas. The slug line pickup area is located on the 1st level parking area.

The instruction is adapted to conform to Fairfax County and Fort Belvoir emergency preparedness and response protocols and procedures. The training consists of a combination of lectures and hands-on demonstrations and drills to develop the stu-

dents' skills in the areas of emergency preparedness, fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, and disaster medical operations. Learn how to prevent the spread and mitigate the impact of public health threats such as measles, the flu, and respiratory viruses like COVID-19. The Lead Instructor will provide prospective students with directions and Post access information, class preparation information and a class schedule (syllabus) at least one week prior to the first class meeting. The text and study guide (Participants Manual) will be issued at the first meeting. Students are also provided with basic personal protective equipment for the training that they may retain upon completion of the course. This training does not require any physical strength or agility.


