While Back-to-School looks very different for most students this year, students still need supplies and children are still outgrowing their clothing. ECHO is distributing school supplies and children's clothing to families who are experiencing hardship this fall. ECHO needs donations of clean, gently used **fall and winter children's clothing.** We **urgently** need children's and teen's shoes, up to men's shoe sizes 7 -10 for teen boys. Please hold donations of

housewares, adult clothing and children's summer clothing until all our volunteers can return to our building. Right now, dealing with donations that we cannot currently distribute creates a large burden for our dedicated volunteer staff. Our greatest needs for school supplies include spiral notebooks (college rule), pocket folders, red ink pens, and primary writing pads. Visit ECHO's website, www.echo-inc.org, and click on "Donate Goods" to find lists of the most-needed supplies.

The need for food assistance in our community is unrelenting. ECHO can use donations of nearly every type of non-perishable food and personal hygiene item. Things that are most needed right now are: rice (boxed is best for us to handle), 2# bags of sugar and flour, dry pasta, dried beans, canned vegetables, laundry detergent, and shaving razors. A longer list is on ECHO's website and is updated regularly. Donors do not have to leave their cars. At the Donation Door, volunteers with masks will unload donations. ECHO, 7205 Old Keene Mill Road, is open weekdays 9:30 am to 12:30 pm, and Tuesday and Thursday evenings 7:00 to 9:00. ECHO continues to be closed on Wednesday evenings.

Fairfax County will hold two Saturday **Stuff the Bus events** to collect non-perishable food for local non-profits. On **September 12**, and **September 26**, from 10:00 am to 3:00 pm, Fastran buses will be parked at locations around the county as collection sites where social distancing can be observed. Donations designated for ECHO will be at the Braddock District Supervisor's Office, 9002 Burke Lake Road, Burke, and at The Oaks Community Center, 5708 Oak Leather Drive, Burke. Your donation helps!

Burke Presbyterian Church, 5690 Oak Leather Drive, Burke, will hold a "**Pop 'n Go" Food Drive** for ECHO on Sunday afternoon, **September 20**, from 1:00 to 3:00. Donors can drive to the "In" driveway of the church, pop open their trunks for volunteers to retrieve their donations, and easily drive back to Oak Leather via the exit driveway. Even if you have only one or two items to donate, or only a short time in your schedule, Burke Presbyterian will happily and safely take your food donation and deliver it to ECHO.

Voting Options

Three Ways to Vote, Including Early Voting Starting Sept. 18.

ABSENTEE VOTE BY MAIL— Due to a new state law, you can absentee vote without needing a reason or excuse — but **you still have to apply** to absentee vote by mail.

If you plan to vote by mail, you should apply now due to the anticipated large number of applications. Fairfax County election officials strongly recommend you apply well before the Friday, Oct. 23 deadline since mail delivery could be slower, according to the U.S. Postal Service.

The fastest and most secure way to apply is online on the Virginia Department of Elections website. You'll also be able to track the status of your application, as well as when your ballot is mailed to you. Your Virginia driver's license number is needed to apply online, along with the last four digits of your Social Security number.

Voters should be aware that they won't begin to receive their ballots until after Friday, Sept. 18.

VOTE EARLY— Early voting begins on Friday, Sept. 18, and any registered voter may cast their ballot in person.

Early voting will be available at the Fairfax County Government Center in Conference Rooms 2/3 starting on Friday, Sept. 18. Hours will be Monday to Friday from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Fourteen satellite early voting locations will be open from Oct. 14 -31 from 8:00 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday hours from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. will be offered beginning Saturday, Oct. 17.

Currently, the voting hours at these locations will be from 1 to 7 p.m., Mondays to Fridays, and 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturdays. The last day to vote early is Saturday, Oct. 31, at 5 p.m.

VOTE IN PERSON ON ELECTION DAY— Every polling place in Fairfax County will be open as usual on Election Day, Tuesday, Nov. 3.

The polls will be open from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. You should double check your polling place online on the state's website.

DROP-OFF BOXES— It is likely that a new state law will allow the use of ballot drop-off boxes for the first time in the Nov. 3 election. Assuming the law's passage, the state must then adopt regulations on their use, which could take up to 30 days. However, Fairfax County is making plans to offer drop-off boxes, and voters will be provided with more information once the state's regulations are promulgated. In the meantime, voters can bring their cast absentee ballots to the Fairfax County Office of Elections if they choose not to mail them back.

The History of Springfield, Virginia

Springfield historian Robyn Carter has graciously agreed to write several articles about the history of Springfield in honor of Springfield's anniversary year, 2021. Robyn is the authority on all things Springfield! Thanks Robyn for sharing your expertise with us!

Springfield and How It Came To Be

As of December 2021, two important anniversaries for the Springfield community will be upon us. First will be the 75th anniversary of when Washington area builder/developer Edward R. Carr purchased the large tract on which he envisioned creating a "satellite city" to solve the problem of a tremendous housing shortage in the DC area during the early post-World War 2 years. Additionally, it will also commemorate the 70th anniversary of when ground was broken by The Crestwood Construction Corporation for the initial 13 model homes from which modern Springfield began to take shape.

It has long been said that the Springvale subdivision was the "first" when Vernon Lynch and Sons began to sell residential building lots there in 1947. However, there was a large difference between that and the fully developed subdivisions that came from the huge preplanned areas that Mr. Carr developed and Crestwood had the honor of building in that first phase of turning rural land into a thriving part of the Fairfax County landscape.

The lots that Mr. Lynch and his family were selling were rural plots of land on which the buyers were responsible for building their own homes without the benefits of what we, today understand as being part of a developed subdivision. There was no public water or sewerage to those lots as well as no paved streets, curbs or gutters. For context, think of Springvale in those years as what one would think of today as buying a lot way out in the country that has been subdivided from a large tract but the only "improvements" were a dirt/gravel road and access to electricity.

Perhaps hard to envision today but as of the late 1940s and early 1950s Springfield was indeed very rural and for the most part cut off from the long developed parts of closer in (to DC) areas of Arlington and Alexandria. In fact, as of 1946 the area included little more than a small railroad depot on the north side of the tracks just east of where the Backlick Road overpass is today and a collection of widely separated houses over the sprawling countryside.

One reason that Mr. Carr made the investment in the remote Springfield area was, as mentioned previously, the critical need for housing in the area following the economic impact of The Great Depression of the 1930s and the rationing and lack of human-power to build needed homes during World War 2. Springfield was the last available large land mass within a 12 mile radius of DC and it was soon to become more accessible thanks to the new Shirley Highway (now 395/95) that was under construction to link Washington to Woodbridge with a limited access, 4 lane, divided high speed roadway that was planned to go right past part of the Springfield tract. Land records show that Carr and a small group of investors purchased the initial 2,300 acres of land from H&H Development Corp on December 30, 1946.

Over the course of the next five years Carr, Inc and its associates began the pre-planning work in the hopes of not only getting water, sewer and gas lines extended to the property, but also they set about deciding where the residential, shopping, roads and other infrastructure would be placed to avoid some of the problems that had arisen in older, less organized developments in the past. Although, thanks to later growth and change, many of the pre-planning benefits are no longer evident as they once had been, Springfield deserves the honor of being one of the largest pre-planned communities of its type east of Chicago up to that time. Reston often gets the

glory for being the first fully pre-planned local community and indeed it deserves recognition for having been able to maintain more of its structure, but Springfield really deserves the honor for being first in Fairfax County.

Upon the success of getting the basic utilities run to Springfield, Mr. Carr determined that the building of the houses would require more than his firm was ready to handle alone, so on April 15th, 1951, his firm sold 593 acres to The Crestwood Construction Corporation to kick off what was to become one of the most important residential communities in Fairfax County history.....Crestwood's Springfield.

In our next issue, look for more information on that landmark development as well as some of the other early subdivisions as Springfield was being transformed into the thriving historic community you live in today.

Functional Needs Registry

The Functional Needs Registry is a tool for Fairfax County in pre-event emergency planning, resource management and communicating with families and individuals who have identified a disability or access and functional need. The Functional Needs Registry has 12 functional need categories to select, as well as a "care provider" category for those who care for someone with a disability or access and functional need. Functional need categories include: Care provider, Dialysis, Hearing Impairment, Language Interpreter Needed, Life Sustaining Equipment Required, Mental/Cognitive Condition, Mobility Impairment, Refrigerated Medication, Service Animal, Speech Impairment, Supplemental Oxygen Required, Vision Impairment.

The registry is part of the Office of Emergency Management's efforts to assist residents in preparing and planning for emergencies. For example, prior to or during a crisis emergency, Fairfax County staff uses this notification system to inform of potential dangers or emergencies that could affect those in our community and to provide timely updates to residents.

There is no guarantee that services will be provided, nor does registration guarantee that services will be received on a preferential basis. Residents should continue to follow emergency protocol by calling 9-1-1 in the event of a lifethreatening emergency even though they have subscribed to this registry.

You can sign up for the Functional Needs Registry at www.fairfaxcounty.gov/alerts. If you have any questions or need more information, call the Office of Emergency Management at 571-350-1000, TTY 711.

CAC/Citizen Advisory Committee

Recently a couple in our community (who would like to remain anonymous) donated Chick-Fil-A gift cards through the CAC for the officers at the Franconia District Station. We were able to arrange for

grab-n-go boxed meals for the evening and midnight squads on Tuesday and Wednesday of this week. Each box contained a warm chicken sandwich, a bag of waffle chips, and a chocolate chip cookie for dessert!



The officers were very appreciative of this kind gesture, and really felt the support from the community...especially during these trying times!

The CAC delivered 6 dozen cookies for the A and B Squads to let the officers know that we support them! Each cookie was individually wrapped for safety and it made it easy for the officers to grab-ngo.



The CAC also placed these kindness rocks in the mulch around the two small trees at the entrance to the station, so the officers will see them as they come and go. Just another way to show them that we support them!



Eviction Moratorium

The CDC this week issued a universal eviction moratorium that applies to nonpayment of rent.

It takes effect on September 4 and lasts through December 31.

It applies to all tenants who present a signed declaration to their landlords.

The declaration requires the tenant state that:

Their income is less than \$99,000, they did not have to pay income tax in 2019, or they received a stimulus check.

They are unable to pay rent due to income loss or extraordinary out-of-pocket medical expenses.

They would become homeless or need to double-up if evicted.

They will still make partial payments ("using best efforts to make timely partial payments that are as close to the full payment as the individual's circumstances may permit, taking into account other non-discretionary expenses").

This moratorium is a floor, it applies wherever there is not a more protective state moratorium in effect.

There are criminal penalties for violations

Governor Northam's eviction moratorium in Virginia ends September 7 and evictions are currently being reviewed by the General Assembly.

In Fairfax County, the Eviction Prevention Task Force is working proactively to communicate the resources available for tenants with those in the eviction process. We are also working with local landlords to launch a housing stability pledge for residents who demonstrate a significant financial impact from the COVID-19 pandemic.

Housing Resources

For assistance with rent (or utilities and food), please call Fairfax County Coordinated Services Planning at 703-222-0880.

The line is multilingual and Fairfax County doesn't ask for immigration status.

Search this database to see if your residence is covered by moratoriums.

Stay Home Virginia, provides resources for renters, homeowners, landlords, and the homeless.

For <u>FCRHA</u> residents: If you are experiencing difficulties in meeting monthly rent payment, you should contact your assigned housing specialist.

Virginia Poverty Law Center: Call the Eviction Helpline, 833-NOEVICT (833-663-8428) in English and Spanish.

Legal Services of Northern Virginia: Call 703-778-6800 from 9:30am-12:30pm and from 1:30-3:30pm, Monday-Thursday.

Woman's Club of Springfield

The COVID-19 pandemic has presented new challenges for all our local service organizations, and the Woman's Club of Springfield is no exception.

Our club meetings, as well as District and State meetings were all cancelled or held by Zoom. In March, we had to temporarily close our Pink Elephant Shop (PE) for the safety of our members. Donations to the community and other organizations then had to be curtailed due to lack of funds. We were happy to be able to give a generous donation to ECHO. We are happy to say that we are looking forward to brighter days. The Pink Elephant Shop re-opened on August 18th.

The Pink Elephant has adapted to the COVID-19 reality. Because many of our members don't feel safe volunteering at this time



because of age and health issues, we are only able to be open three days a week — Tuesday, Wednesday and Saturday. Pink Elephant hours are as follows: consignments only from 9:30 a.m. to 10:45 a.m., and customers from 11 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

Social distancing issues have resulted in changes to consignment and customer policies. These changes are posted at the Shop, but if you have any questions, please call the Shop on Tuesday, Wednesday or Saturday at (703) 451-2567 for pertinent information. We regret that we cannot accept new consignors or donations until further notice.

The Pink Elephant is following protocols for COVID-19 safety. We have spacing lines on the floor and a plexiglass shield at the counter. Hand sanitizer is available as you enter the store, and we ask that you use it. Masks are a MUST.

We are pleased that many of our customers and consignors have returned, and we are happy to have them back in the Pink Elephant Shop.

We are also very grateful to the Springfield Civic Association for its support and assistance in announcing our re-opening on Facebook and through Nextdoor Springfield — thank you, Sandy Frieswyk!

Book Review: In Five Years



The premise of *In Five Years* by Rebecca Serle is a young woman getting a fleeting glimpse of what her life will be like in five years. Of course, what she sees in the dream is nothing like her present life, family and friends have changed - some are still in her life and others are not. The main character is involved in an accident and regains consciousness five years later and some of what she envisioned has come to fruition. I like reading books that grab your attention and will not let you do anything but read, cooking and cleaning fade into the far recesses of your life. This book did not deliver me from tasks that needed to be done, but I didn't mind ending the day by reading a chapter or two. The book does reinforce the realization that we have no idea what our lives will be like in the future. I did enjoy it. Ms. Serle has also written *The Dinner List* and a number of young adult novels.



Book Review: Courting Mr. Lincoln




Experienced historian novelist Louis Bayard combines kernels of history with writing expertise to present an unusual look at the life of Abraham Lincoln. Alternating sections of story highlight the two individuals who sought Mr. Lincoln's attention. Mary Todd would not be a surprise but Bayard also shows his close friendship with Joshua Speed, a shopkeeper turned politician. The two were definitely roommates, but was it a homosexual relationship? The two men shared a bed saving money as was common in the era. It was Joshua who taught the country bumpkin, Abraham, the cultural aspects of life in the big city of Springfield. Those scenes are particularly entertaining. All three are unique individuals and were often a trio. Details of life in the 1840's are shown, presenting it with the appropriate era-correct dialog Bayard provides the story but never gives the answer to that key question even when the two men meet again later after Lincoln is President. A thoughtful, provocative example of historical fiction.

Book Review: Can't Hurt Me

This is a biography of David Goggins, retired Navy SEAL and the only U.S. Armed Forces member ever to complete SEAL training, U.S. Army Ranger School and Air Force Tactical Air Controller training. He's also an ultra-athlete (and firefighter and motivational speaker). Any one of these accomplishments would be inspiring on its own but all together they are physically amazing. Goggins overcame a number of challenges that would sideline most people but he is driven to achieve and master his body and his mind. Suffering childhood abuse, learning difficulties, stuttering, prejudice, etc. he channeled his rage into vanquishing whatever was in his path. It's an easy read and it was interesting to learn about his life journey. The first half of the book easily held my attention but the second half was somewhat of a slog as he described his numerous and varied challenges with training for/competing in ultra-athletic events (marathons, triathlons, Guinness World Record pull-up record). His accomplishments are amazing but I wanted to hear more about some of his relationships (his mother was a constant figure in his life, he eventually reconciled



with his brother but he shared little to nothing about his marriages or children). Check out davidgoggins.com to learn more.

Book Review: The Victory Garden

If you watched *Downton Abbey* you can visualize the initial scenes of *The Victory Garden* by Rhys Bowen: rich daughter wants independence and falls in love with Australian who seems of lower class. The time is 1918 in Great Britain, an era when rich and poor do not mix socially. However, Emily, our heroine, seeking independence and wanting to serve her country, enlists in the British Women's Land Army to learn farming and gardening skills to feed the homeland since so few men were there. These skills prove useful to maintain her independence from her pushy haughty parents. With time she bridges the gaps forming friendships with both classes making the plot more interesting historically depicting life. The reader learns what life was like both above and below the stairwell. Two adjectives come to mind to describe Emily. The first is stubborn as she is determined not to go to her parents for help. The second adjective will be a question for readers to answer. Was she unrealistic in her determined quest? The story flows freely with historic details woven easily into place.

There is even a small mystery to solve before the concluding page.

The camera has always been a close assistant of hers, offering a means to capture moments in time. Two years later, after several on site meetings with SCA members and VDOT representatives, the sidewalk was widened and repaired and the overgrowth and poison ivy was treated. What an improvement!!! 






National Night Out

Trails for Youth

TrailsforYouth.Org Supports SCA Area Youth at Brookfield Park

This hasn't been the typical summer for any of us and TrailsforYouth.Org is no exception. We have had to modify many of our events and be creative in how we can provide outdoor and biking opportunities for our surrounding families. This past Spring, we provided a short term loaner bicycle program to many of the local TYO youth so they could ride a bike and get outdoor exercise, even if we couldn't be there with them. In addition, our Girls Rolling and Learning STEM (GRLS) in Nature program planned for outdoor classroom implementation was revamped to be a hybrid program – a combination of online virtual classes and then inperson open field (socially distant appropriate) skills sessions and riding. Our GRLS in Nature program uses the bicycle to teach a myriad of STEM concepts and principles that teaches the girls' first-hand how specific scientific ideas apply to everyday activities. During our virtual class time, we interactively explored many scientific principles then implemented those principles during the week or when we were able to gather in the field and ride. For example, we taught the youth about kinetic and potential energy. Then, when we met in person, we used Brookfield Park's open field and bicycle pump track for the girls to understand this concept. We used the Brookfield Park bicycle pump track to show how to generate energy on a bicycle without pedaling and keep it going. We also utilized the open field to explore other learning opportunities, while maintaining social distance and wearing masks. The girls were able to get some exercise, and turn the conceptual ideas of STEM into concrete understanding of how the ideas apply in life. This hybrid program helped to foster a greater understanding and appreciation of STEM ideas and applications, provided much needed fresh air and outdoor exercise, improved their bike skills and they had fun – win-win for all!

In addition to providing the Girls STEM program, TYO has submitted a proposal to the Park Authority to enhance the cycling opportunities at Brookfield Park. During the quarantine, Brookfield Park bicycle pump track was used heavily by local families as an ideal space for outdoor recreation and social distance safety. Unfortunately its current design is limited to only a few youth at a time. TYO, in coordination with the Park Authority, is planning to build a small bicycle skills trail around the perimeter of the bicycle pump track that compliments current access and provides additional cycling opportunities which means less waiting to ride. This trail will consist of professionally built skills stations that will provide another opportunity for local kids to hone their cycling abilities while having fun. TYO believes that this infrastructure provides opportunity for local youth to keep riding and enjoying the park, even when we can't be there. As one father commented to us during the quarantine, "This track is perfect; my son wouldn't touch his strider bike at home, now he wants to come here and ride over and over and is learning how to ride. It's great, we love it!" This sentiment has been shared by dozens of local families.
