The Board of Supervisors announced on Friday April 23rd the selection of Kevin Davis, former Police Commissioner of the Baltimore Police Department, as the new Fairfax County Chief of Police.

I believe Kevin Davis will bring a renewed commitment to data transparency, eliminating disparities in use of force, and other common-sense reforms to our police department and I look forward to working closely with him to meet the commitments and expectations that Fairfax County residents and public safety professionals have expressed in our county's Public Safety Community Input Matrix, and in the multiple forums that our Board has conducted.

ECHO



ECHO is proud to announce two new programs to assist people who are struggling to succeed. Knowing that transportation problems keep people from getting or keeping jobs, ECHO is partnering with Cardinal Plaza Shell to assist clients who are in need of basic car repairs. This will not only help clients with employment issues, but it should enhance highway safety in our community. Secondly, because baby diapers constitute a major expense for families, ECHO, in another new initiative, is expanding its access to diapers for clients with young children. Through the work of volunteers and the generosity of donors, ECHO is now giving clients about a month's supply of diapers rather than a week's supply. This will represent significant economic help for families.

You can help ECHO with a couple of clicks! Volunteers serve local families who find themselves in financial difficulty usually because of an emergency situation. In addition to assistance with food and housing costs, ECHO currently helps families with growing children's clothing as well as with hygiene supplies. ECHO needs donations of baby diapers, feminine hygiene products, specific kinds of baby formula, and new or gently used children's and teen clothing, especially pajamas, sneakers, shorts, and hoodies. ECHO maintains a wishlist on the Amazon.com site. Donors who wish to contribute items that are most urgently needed may purchase from the site and have those donations shipped directly to ECHO. Locating the wishlist on the Amazon site is challenging, so we suggest starting at ECHO's homepage at www.echo-inc.org and clicking on the link to Amazon.

This month, ECHO's Food Pantry needs canned meats, 2# bags of sugar or flour, cooking oil, jelly, canned tomatoes, shampoo, shaving cream, detergent, bath soap. ECHO welcomes the help of organizations or individuals who are interested in holding a food drive. There are suggestions for organizing a drive at www.echo-inc.org. See "How to Hold a Donation Drive" under "Donate Goods." Our address is 7205 Old Keene Mill Road, Springfield. We are open to accept donations Monday through Friday, 9:30 am to 12:30 pm and Tuesday and Thursday evenings, 7:00 to 9:00. Please drive to the west side of the building and stop at the Donation Door where volunteers (who are masked) will assist with your donation and offer written receipts.

The annual Letter Carrier Food Drive, usually held in May, normally yields a lot of donations that help carry the ECHO Food Pantry through the lower donation months of summer. This year, however, that drive, also known as Stamp Out Hunger, will not take place. Community food drives such as the ones announced below give donors who can't come to ECHO during regular hours of operation an opportunity to be a part of ECHO's mission.

Chairman McKay's Covid Vaccine Information

Governor Northam amended Executive Order 72 to adopt new guidance from the CDC on mask use in outdoor settings.

The CDC guidelines state that fully vaccinated individuals do not have to wear masks outdoors when alone or in small gatherings. Mask use is still required indoors and outdoors at large crowded events like concerts, sporting events, and graduation ceremonies. People are considered fully vaccinated two weeks after receiving the last required dose of vaccine. Read more here.

And in case you haven't heard, Fairfax County residents 16 years and older are eligible to receive the COVID-19 vaccine. I am pleased that there is enough vaccine for everyone who wants to be vaccinat-

The CVC is located in the former Lord & Taylor at 7950 Tysons Corner Center, McLean, VA, 22102.

News From FLAP (Friends of Lake Accotink Park)

Margaret Kinder Education and Pollinator Garden - Lake Accotink Park

April 2021 marks five years since the initial conception of this educational pollinator garden. The original Lake Accotink Park Pollinator Garden was planted in the traffic circle and maintained there for years. In 2016 it was noted as a safety hazard, as the plants matured to over six feet tall, blocking the view from one side to the other of oncoming traffic. The garden relocation (from the traffic circle) and expansion (to its current location) were based on the need for an ADA accessible – educationally focused pollinator garden. A partnership between FCPA and the Friends of Lake Accotink Park (FLAP) made this happen. This has occurred through a myriad of tasks that included, but were not limited to: designing (garden, signs, brochure), planning, securing stakeholders and donors, ground preparation, planting, naming, scheduling, maintaining (weeding/watering /mulching) removing all the foliage, prepping, planting, installing soaker hoses, recruiting volunteers, designing signage, coordinating, and communicating. FCPA and FLAP volunteers made this garden a reality. FLAP dedicated resources and over 4,900 hours from April 2018 to its official dedication April 17 2021. The pollinator garden now showcases over 800 plants of 14 different varieties, attracting many varieties of birds, butterflies, bees, and yes, even humans.

In 2018 efforts to move forward took hold as both FCPA and FLAP committed time and effort to the project. FLAP leadership worked diligently to identify the new pollinator garden location, and further to identify it as an educational resource to raise environmental awareness to Lake Accotink Park patrons. We began our effort, requiring the garden to be large, include a good number of indigenous plant species, and be in an ADA accessible location. FLAP reached out to Merrifield Garden Center for help with designing the garden, and Ms. Kerri Blackman developed several designs for FCPA and FLAP review. After several months, the new location, and overall design was approved. This plan also included the removal and refurbishment of the traffic circle adjacent to the marina, by planting a single Sugar Maple Tree.

Throughout the following year, dozens of FLAP volunteers dedicated over 4,800 hours removing the foliage, rocks and debris from both locations and readying the soil for the installation of the watering system, mulching, and then planting 800+ plants - 14 varieties of indigenous plants, their name plaques development and placement.

The resolution to dedicate the garden to Margaret Kinder was presented by FLAP to the FCPA Board. The resolution was passed by the FCPA board to dedicate this garden to Margaret Kinder, honoring her decades of service to Lake Accotink Park, the Ravensworth Community, and the County of Fairfax.

"We look forward to educating the community, concerning the benefits of a pollinator garden, by encouraging our youth to attend our upcoming classes and planting their own pollinator garden, maintaining this beautiful garden and providing classes and starter plants. We could not have accomplished the first and only ADA approved Educational Pollinator Garden, designed, maintained and funded by a friends group, FLAP, without our partnership with FCPA, Lake Accotink Park and our Community of dedicated Volunteers and Donors."



Book Review: A Woman of No Importance (The Untold Story of the American Spy Who Helped Win WW II)
By Barbara Gilchrist



Published in 2019 this is yet another New York Times bestseller, this true history reads like a traditional spy novel — covert operations, guerilla warfare, infiltrating the enemy, cover names, masterful disguises — it's all in there! What makes this riveting culmination of years of research truly interesting is the protagonist is a female — a spy, who in true American fashion for women and minorities, had to leave the country to realize her potential and truly use her talents. Virginia Hall, born into the upper crust of Baltimore society, rejected the societal expectations of a young lady of her station and, instead, chose to pursue the life of a spy. Despite having a prosthetic leg (she lost her leg as a result of a hunting accident in Turkey), Virginia was so effective in working behind enemy lines, the Gestapo in 1942 issued an urgent command across France: "She is the most dangerous of all Allied spies. We must find and destroy her." They never did.

Masterfully, author Sonia Purnell, takes the reader behind enemy lines and deep into the covert operations Virginia led in Nazi-occupied France. Virginia's fierce resistance, strong determination and willingness to kill if needed helped the Allies liberate France and win WWII. She was never given the salary nor the recognition she deserved. In fact, she waged an ongoing battle against male chauvinism, jealousy and sexism simply to do her job. She persevered anyway.


This book is well worth reading, and I encourage the reader to dig in and solve the mystery of "Cuthbert" as well as dig into the intricacies and difficulties of operating behind enemy lines where death could be slow and painful if discovered. It depicts the true life of a spy.

Virginia Hall never cared about recognition (but you can find her recognized in the CIA Museum) or salary. She simply followed her "calling" to work for those who were significantly oppressed. While slow at times, I found *A Woman of No Importance* well worth reading. "Check it out" today! (cont'd on pg. 8)

Book Review: The Luminaries

We have been living in times when a novel of Victorian proportions can be a welcome way to brighten long days spent at home. If you love a gripping plot, a wide array of colorful characters, and the unerring command of words and detail that distinguished great novelists of a previous century, this is the read for you! This 2013 Booker Prize winner delivers all of these things but with a twist. While set in the late 1800s, it is the work of young New Zealand author, Eleanor Catton, and the location is her home country. I did not know that there had been a goldrush in New Zealand, but it is a New Zealand goldrush town that is the setting for this marvelous yarn. It is populated by the diverse assortment of protagonists, rogues, and oddballs one might expect in such a turbulent place, each personality revealed through their own actions, thoughts, and words. As the plot unfolds through the eyes of each character in turn, it never fails to intrigue, drawing the reader in ever deeper. The author's language is a delight, and many meticulously-researched details paint the sights and sounds forming the backdrop to this absorbing tale.

She has her undergraduate degree in Biology from the University of Virginia and a master's degree in plant ecology from Virginia Tech. She has been awarded two gold medals (2007, 2018) at the Royal Horticultural Society Botanical Art shows in London and her work is in the Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation. Her artwork appears in the latest *Peterson's Field Guide to Mushrooms* and *ASBA's Botanical Art Techniques Handbook*.

The subjects of her art are artifacts of the natural world, and reveal detailed evidence of the natural processes of growth, reproduction, and decay. She finds inspiration in a carrot that has gone to flower, a broken seedpod, twisted roots or insect damage to a leaf. She strives to make a plant portrait in such a way that it reveals its character and uniqueness. Her focus on the small details and celebration of the everyday hopefully inspires others to look a bit deeper and linger a bit longer. She has gained international recognition with the creation of her "perpetual journal" that has inspired naturalists around the world to start their own.

Trails for Youth

Brookfield Park NEW Mountain Bike Skills Area - Great Addition to a Wonderful Park.

After a year of planning and fundraising, it took just two and half days and a forklift to build the Brookfield Park mountain bike skills area. This is a wonderful addition to the existing pump track and the park as a whole. The first Saturday it was available, local families spent the day learning new mountain biking skills that will translate to making them better, safer, mountain bikers. So far the youngest rider has been age 3 and ½ and the oldest age 60. Perhaps more importantly youth and families now have another place to gather and talk and play. As one local parent said, "This is so fun, and a wonderful gem for our community. We love it!"

TrailsforYouth.Org knew the potential this new addition to the park would add and it exceeds our expectations. We are so happy to see neighborhood youth and full families coming down and exploring the park to see what it's all about. The kids in our program not only enjoy the new equipment but recognize the hard work it took to get it built. They stepped up on Saturday to help new riders learn, and when they weren't doing that, they grabbed a bag and started picking up trash. TYO will be continuing to hold organized skills sessions for local youth on Tuesdays (5:30 pm weather permitting), but it's bigger than just TYO. There was talk of holding a women's specific skills session on Wednesdays and Family Fun Friday nights. The good news is the equipment is part of the park, just like the playground, and is there for everyone to safely enjoy. Children 15 and under are required to wear a helmet (and we recommend adults do too).

Already our partners at the Mid-Atlantic Off-Road Enthusiasts (MORE) are working with us to plan a workday to improve the trail between Brookfield Park and the Cross County Trail. With this trail walkers and bikers can continue to explore the surrounding parks and enjoy nature. It just keeps getting better and better, just like our little SCA neighborhood. Recycle Fairfax

Update on Food Waste Pilot Program—The good waste drop off center at the Transfer Station on West Ox Road in Fairfax and the I-95 Landfill Complex in Lorton are doing well. As of last month we have recycled over **20,000 lbs. of compostable organics** (more than **10 tons!**).

Specialty Wastes Accepted at County Facilities— Some waste should never be placed in your trash can, and not in your recycling bin either. We are talking about items such as household hazardous waste (HHW) and electronics. Unwanted electronics and common household hazardous materials have potentially dangerous components and chemicals that should be kept out of our environment and regular trash.

Fairfax County offers HHW and electronics drop off at our <u>facilities</u> at the I-66 Transfer Station and the I-95 Landfill Complex. HHW will be disposed of properly, as will electronic components that are not able to be recycled/refurbished. Hours of operations and materials accepted can be found <u>here</u>. These services are free of charge for household items from County residents.

There are also opportunities for businesses that generate small quantities of hazardous waste to properly recycle or dispose of these items through the county's very small quantity generator (VSQG) program.

Refuse, Reduce, and Reuse— Here are some ideas on how to practice these new, even better "Three R's".

- **Reuse What You Don't Need.** Some ideas: Bring your own Tupperware to restaurants and refuse plastic straws. Remove yourself from junk mail lists. Carry a reusable bag in your purse or in your car. Request no plastic utensils when getting takeout and carry your own reusable water bottle.
- **Buy Used.** You can find everything from clothing to building materials at consignment shops and reuse centers. Items are less expensive and in good condition.
- Look for products that use less packaging. Less packaging means less use of raw materials. This reduces costs and the savings can be passed along to the consumer. Buying in bulk can reduce packaging and save money.
- **Buy reusable over disposable items.** For example try bringing your own utensils to work to each lunch rather than using plastic forks and spoons. Try to bring your own container to the restaurant for taking food home.
- Maintain and repair products like clothing, furniture, and appliances.
- Borrow, rent, or share items that are used infrequently like party decorations, or tools.

Oyster Shell Recycling— Yes, you can recycle oyster shells! Oyster shells are the most natural material to rebuild oyster reefs, but they are in very short supply. Restaurants and other seafood businesses can help in this important endeavor by donating their used oyster shells. At the <u>I-95 Landfill Complex</u> in Lorton there is a **blue** dumpster for collecting oyster shells. Just remember that this particular dumpster is for oyster shells only – no glass! The glass recycling dumpsters are painted **purple**.

New Fairfax County Police Chief

Kevin Davis is the new Chief of the Fairfax County Police Department effective May 3rd. He takes over from Deputy County Executive for Public Safety Dave Rohrer, who has been acting as Interim Chief since the retirement of Chief Edwin C. Roessler in February.

Chief Davis served as the City of Baltimore's Police Commissioner from 2015 to 2018. He had previously served as Chief of Police of Anne Arundel County, MD, from 2013 to 2014 and as Assistant Chief of the Prince George's County, MD Police Department from 1992 to 2013. He has recently worked as Director of Consulting services for GardaWorld, the world's largest privately owned security services company.

On May 7, Chief Kevin Davis held his first press conference at the Public Safety Headquarters highlighting his first week in Fairfax County. During the busy week, he met with local government officials, Department senior leadership and officers at the Mount Vernon District Station. He discussed his family legacy in policing which led him to become a fourthgeneration public servant. The values he learned in his early years inspired him to a life of service to the community.

History of Springfield

History of Springfield Part 5 - The Sign and Other Things.

Hello Springfielders! Welcome to the spring season and all the beauty that it brings to the community!

During the years of sharing my research about Springfield's early development period on various Facebook groups and other media, I've often been asked a very logical question that has confounded residents and visitors alike. With the recent, glorious restoration of the historic "Crestwood's Springfield" sign, I thought this would be a good time to answer the often asked question of....."Why does the Crestwood's Springfield sign read the way it does?" Due to the possessive in the name it has often made folks wonder...."if it's "Crestwood" then why the 's"??

The reason has a multi-part back story, so here goes. First off, I'll start with the developer of the area, Mr. Edward R. Carr. As brilliant and forward thinking that he was, it seems he had one quirk that eventually led to the naming on that sign. The quirk was that, in some instances, Mr. Carr had a penchant for naming subdivisions with the same name as the geographical areas they were built in. In the case of what we now commonly call "Crestwood", it began about 1950 when Carr had laid out the first few blocks for single family homes along Backlick Rd and Amherst Ave prior to selling that land (and many more undeveloped acres to the west) to The Crestwood Construction Corporation in April 1951 to start building those first houses. In creating a name for that proposed first subdivision, Mr. Carr gave it the legal name "Springfield", and thus that name shows on the deeds for the homes in "Crestwood". The redundancy either didn't occur to Mr. Carr or he didn't think it was an issue but when you stop to think about it....just imagine how it would be for homeowners (when trying to narrow down their location) to have to say "I live in the Springfield subdivision in Springfield, Virginia."

Apparently this anomaly did occur to the owners of Crestwood Construction. At this point it is unlikely that we will ever learn exactly whether they 1) could not change the legal description for the subdivision name upon their purchase of the land, or 2) it was an expense they felt wasn't worth it, and/or 3) their marketing minds kicked in. Whatever their reason(s) their solution was the wording of that sign. Adding their name as a possessive on the sign indicated that although the subdivision carries the name Springfield, the addition of their company name did indicate some differentiation between their subdivision and the community at large. Due to the wording of the sign and just convenient shorthand, the early residents in the area began simply calling the subdivision "Crestwood" and to most modern residents that is the identifier they use rather than the legal subdivision name. From a name recognition standpoint, the executives assured that the name of their company would live on far beyond its actual lifespan as a corporate entity in the home building business. The company capitalized on this idea from what can only be surmised as a purely marketing standpoint in a couple of their other subdivisions later on, which did not have the redundancy problem they had in that first subdivision. This is why we have Crestwood Park (in North Springfield), Crestwood Manor (in Annandale) still carrying the corporate name, long after the public at large has no idea who Crestwood Construction Corporation was, let alone realize the tremendous impact the firm had in the building of thousands of homes in Northern Virginia.

While on the subject of naming....with residents beginning to enjoy more of the local parks, I thought folks might like to know why the name "Brookfield" adorns both a local park but also a long standing local shopping center and post office location.

When it was decided that their owned land west of the Crestwood subdivision was too hilly & rocky for the company to build housing on, Crestwood Construction donated the land to Fairfax County for the use we know it to be today. Early reports showed that the park (based on proximity) would be named "Crestwood Park" (not to be confused with the later subdivision mentioned above) but in November of 1955 a decision was made by the county to honor a prominent local long term living resident, Mr. John W Brookfield Sr.

A Virginia native, Mr. Brookfield was born near The Plains on September 23, 1876, moving to the Springfield area in 1904. He remained an important and active citizen here until his death on October 3, 1958 at the age of 82. Mr. Brookfield worked for the first Springfield post office station from when it first opened until his retirement from there 30 years later. He served Fairfax County in various capacities such as being Chairman of The Fairfax County Park Authority and joined the first Fairfax County Chamber of Commerce as its president. In fact, Mr. Brookfield was with that Chamber of Commerce during the time they were instrumental in starting the county's early zoning and planning system. He held memberships in the Fairfax County Welfare Department, The Springfield Civic Association and several other important organizations before and during the early development of the Springfield area. Lastly I will mention that in addition to his many civic activities he was instrumental in the effort to get Gunston Hall willed to the state.

Because of his many decades of service to Fairfax County, it was only appropriate that his name was bestowed upon one of the community's first park areas.

Since the current post office location was planned to be included when the shopping center was built in the late 1950s, it's no big guess as to why the center was christened The Brookfield Shopping Center considering his long history with the old Springfield Post Office earlier in the century as well as his tremendous impact on Fairfax County as a whole.

Until the next edition of The Springfield Reporter, Ye Olde Historian bids you all a wonderful remainder of the spring season and a happy and healthy beginning of summer.
