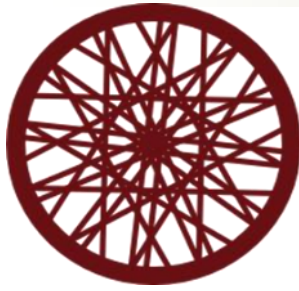

I hope you and your families had a joyful and safe holiday break. As you may have witnessed during our recent snowstorm, it is vital to be prepared and informed during weather emergencies. Below are a few helpful links:

If you cannot get a response from a County agency during an emergency, please email my office at leedist@fairfaxcounty.gov and a member of my staff will assist you.

Also, as of January 1, 2022, disposable plastic bags provided at grocery stores, convenience stores, and drugstores in Fairfax County are subject to a five-cent tax. Similar to a user fee, only customers who use the provided plastic bags would pay the tax. You may use personal reusable shopping bags or refrain from using a plastic bag to avoid the tax. Paper bags are not subject to the five-cent tax, although certain retailers may have their own fees for paper bags.

The purpose of the tax is to curb our collective use of disposable plastic bags and to reduce the amount of plastic waste in our local waterways, roadways, and mitigate the damage it causes. Plastic pollution is a serious problem for ecological and health reasons. Revenue from the tax will

be allocated toward environmental cleanup programs, pollution and litter mitigation programs, and educational programs on environmental waste reduction.

Last but not least, the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors approved two important items during our December meeting. First, the Board approved expanding the real estate tax relief program for seniors and people with disabilities. The expanded program will now allow people with higher incomes and net worth to qualify, add a new 75% tax relief bracket, and offer an option to defer tax payments. These changes are the first to the program in more than 15 years. The increased relief will be phased in over the next two years. Second, the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors adopted new local election districts as a result of its redistricting efforts. The adopted redistricting plan maintains nine election districts for the Board of Supervisors and School Board. However, it shifts seven precincts into different districts, moving them in whole or in part:

- 626 - Saratoga (from Mount Vernon to Springfield)
- 703—Fort Buffalo (from Providence to Mason)
- 717 - Woodburn (split between Providence and Mason)
- 730 - Penderbrook (from Providence to Springfield)
- 827 - Irving (from Springfield to Braddock)
- 840 - West Springfield (from Springfield to Lee)
- 933 - Compton (from Sully to Springfield)

While these new districts take effect immediately, they are subject to certification by the Virginia Attorney General in accordance with the Virginia Rights of Voters Act of 2021.

My wife and I love Lake Accotink Park. When we moved to Springfield about 20 years ago, we used the trail for jogging. Presently, we are both older and retired from 9 to 5 jobs, so we walk on the trail daily with our dog.

About 10 years ago I became strongly interested in photography. In retirement, I do more than 200 high school athletic events annually as a contract photographer. When we walk, I carry a camera and attempt to capture the lake and its wildlife. ECHO



We know Thanksgiving is past, but ECHO volunteers are currently giving thanks for our community's response to help neighbors who faced personal financial challenges in 2021. Last year, 650 children received toys, games and books, and more than 1000 received filled backpacks for school. ECHO's Food Pantry distributed more than 315,000 pounds of food to stave off hunger for more than 1100 local families. Generous donations of clothing enabled at least 3600 people to find clothing they needed. ECHO provided rent assistance and help with utility payments to keep people from falling behind on rent or suffering utility cutoff. Donations of goods and money allowed ECHO to provide household items such as sheets, pots and pans, as well as personal hygiene supplies and diapers to enable people to live with dignity as they coped with hardship. Thank you, donors, for being the best neighbors!

While ECHO has a large contingent of enthusiastic volunteers, there are a few volunteer openings for specific days. If you are interested in more information about any of the following positions, please email

The ECHO Food Pantry distributes a wide variety of foods to those in need of assistance so that they can make nutritionally complete meals for their households. To do that, ECHO keeps a variety of categories of foods in stock all the time. ECHO needs to replenish

these staple foods and hygiene supplies constantly, so we are grateful for donors to give them any time. A donor may ask for a Food List of these staples from any Donation Door volunteer or check ECHO's website, echo-inc.org, to find this list.

Hours of operation and weather closing information: ECHO has returned to traditional days and times of operation: Monday through Friday, 9:30 am to 12:30 pm and Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings, 7:00 to 9:00, as well as one Saturday morning a month (check echo-inc.org for the date each month). When there is inclement weather that causes Fairfax County Public Schools to close, ECHO will also be closed. Volunteers and donors are advised to check ECHO's website on days when the weather is questionable.

Update on Brandon Avenue Proposal

The Fairfax County Planning and Development staff has suggested that the property at 6235 Brandon Avenue (self storage proposal) be linked with 6245 Brandon Avenue (TownePlace Suites Marriott) under a Planned Development zoning. This would mean that if the nomination for the self-storage business goes forward, plans for improvements of both properties would be made to lend a cohesive look and one that takes revitalization goals into account.

The Lee District Task Force on December 19 voted 12-2 in favor that the nomination for the self-storage proposal be placed on the Work Plan. This included our SCA vote which was a guarded "yes". It reflected the slim approval the SCA Board and community members gave for the project. This recommendation along with the recommendations of county staff planning, and the Planning Commission will go to the Board of Supervisors. If the BOS votes to place this nomination on the Work Plan it is a vote TO FURTHER STUDY WHETHER TO ALLOW FOR THE PROJECT, not a definite nod for the project to come to fruition.

We will continue to keep a close eye on this proposed project and keep you informed as details develop.

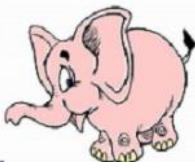

Richard Byrd Library

Greetings from Richard Byrd Library!

Happy New Year!

We continue to serve the Springfield community as best we can during these ever-changing times. In December, we started assisting with the distribution of rapid COVID-19 antigen at-home test kits. The Virginia Department of Health is partnering with libraries as part of a pilot program to provide these tests to the public so community members can know their status and get early care. The BinaxNOW COVID-19 Antigen Card Home Test kits are virtually guided by a trained telehealth proctor; proctors are available who speak English and Spanish. The tests require an internet connection, an internet-enabled device (computer, mobile phone or tablet) with a webcam or front-facing camera, microphone, speaker and supported web browser, and a valid photo ID to show the proctor. Once completed, rapid antigen tests provide results in 15 minutes. Neither proof of residency nor a library card is required to pick up the test kits.

Please call the library before coming to pick up test kits to verify that we have them in stock. For those exhibiting COVID-19 symptoms, we ask that you request kits via the library's contactless curbside pickup service.

We will be kicking off 2022 by going fine-free. The FCPL Board of Trustees approved eliminating fines on most library materials. Overdue fines will remain in effect for some special collections including Chromebooks, mobile hotspots, thermal imaging cameras, and interlibrary loan materials. We are happy to join the many other library systems in Northern Virginia and around the nation who have adopted a fine-free model which removes a significant barrier to equitable access to library materials and services.

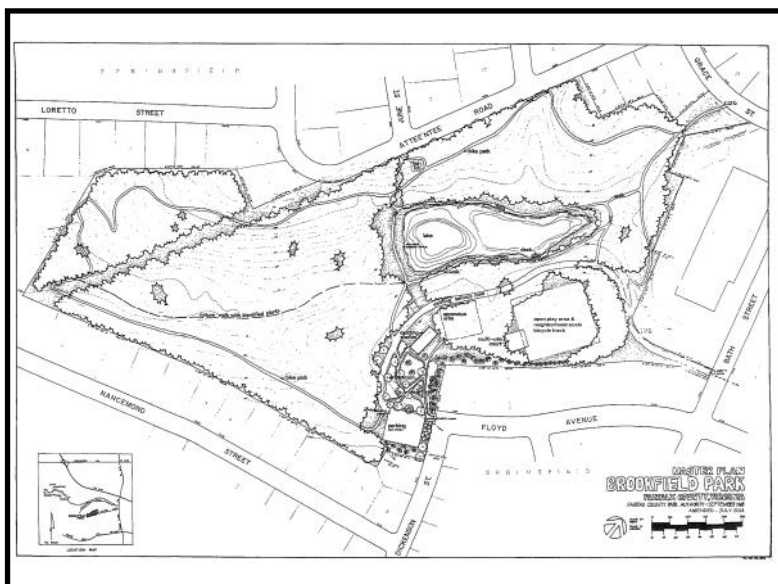

Trails for Youth

- If you have visited Brookfield park lately, you have seen many positive changes. In addition to the pond, playground, bicycle skills area and pump track updates over the last several years, the pavilion is now being updated as well. One of the few sore points however is the status of the trail from Brookfield to the Cross County Trail (CCT) leading to Lake Accotink. The existing trail has constant tree falls and bridges being out and the last section prior to the CCT is a constant wet /mud area.
- Well, good news. The Mid-Atlantic Off-road Enthusiasts (MORE) and TrailsforYouth.Org (TYO) has obtained private funding to update the existing trail to create a dry boardwalk area entering into the CCT side of the existing trail, as well as use volunteer hours to rid the existing trail of downfall trees and debris. In addition to this exciting news, MORE and TYO are working with the Fairfax County Park Authority to build the actual bike trail that was approved in both the original 1969 and amended 2014 masterplan for Brookfield, which will be much more sustainable than the existing nature trail. While this new trail section is still pending and in need of funding, work on the Boardwalk and improvements to the existing trails are expected to begin in the Spring of 2022. In 2021 TYO and MORE volunteered over 250 hours at Brookfield Park, with hundreds of youth utilizing the bicycle pump track and skills area and participating in the TYO events at the park which included a Girls STEM Summer Camp, TYO Pump Track Tuesdays, and practices for the TYO race team. 2022 promises to deliver even more exciting opportunities. 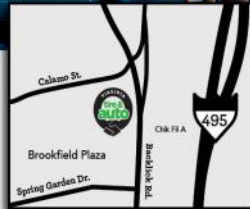
