This has been an action-packed year for the SCA and our community! At our general membership meetings, we commemorated Crestwood's beginnings, celebrated our original homeowners (one of whom turned 100 in 2021!) with the help of the Mount Vernon Community Band, learned more about mental health from the ConnerStrong Foundation and resources available in Fairfax County, heard from Franconia Police Station Captain James Krause and Dr. Noah Fritz (Director, Office of Data Analytics & Strategic Initiatives) on the latest police initiatives, and were updated on the dredging of Lake Accotink and dewatering options by Charles Smith, Chief, Watershed Projects Implementation Branch. Supervisor Lusk Update

Dear Springfield Civic Association Members,

On Saturday, May 7th, the County hosted a ribbon cutting for the New Lee District Community Center located at 7950 Audubon Ave in Alexandria. The community center will have family-friendly recreation, youth programs, and the Workforce Innovation Skills Hub (W.I.S.H). The W.I.S.H. will provide residents with training and job placement in the building trades and in-demand tech jobs. Melwood and Building Momentum, two organizations with successful job training experience, will operate the W.I.S.H. Along with our operators, partnerships are in place with regional employers, including Amazon, Dominion Energy, George Mason University, and Inova Health System.

Also, thank you to those who donated coats, blankets, socks, and gloves for Ukrainian refugees. My office served as a drop-off site and received over eighty bags of donated items! Thanks to the efforts of the community, Fairfax County and our regional partners donated over fifty-five thousand pounds of materials which was enough to fill six tractor trailers.



Last, I'm pleased with the progress on the Fiscal Year 2023 County budget. As you may know, the pandemic has caused car and truck values to increase on average by 33%. In response, for the first time in County history, the Board of Supervisors approved assessing vehicles at only 85% of their market value rather than the standard 100%. This action will provide almost \$98 million in tax relief for vehicle owners.

Vehicle owners will see the 15% assessment reduction automatically incorporated into their personal property tax bills that will be mailed in July. Because this relief will already be applied, taxpayers won't see a separate line on their bill that shows the reduction. I also encourage all eligible seniors and people with disabilities to apply for personal property tax relief. To qualify, residents must meet income and net worth limits with a \$75,000 cap on total net assets as of Dec. 31, 2021. Please reach out to my office if you would like assistance filling out the tax relief application.

I am also pleased to share that in the most recent budget mark-up, the Board proposed, and I supported, a reduction of 3 cents on the real estate tax rate, which would result in approximately \$90 million in savings for homeowners in the County. In addition, the FY 23 Budget fully funds our Fairfax County Public Schools and provides an additional \$6.1 million to address public safety recruitment, retainment, and pay increases.




Directions to May SCA Meeting

Lake Accotink Dam Stream Crossing Project



The Fairfax County Park Authority will soon begin construction on the Lake Accotink Dam Stream Crossing Project (LADSC) at Lake Accotink Park located at 7500 Accotink Park Road in Springfield, Virginia.

The contractor, Franco's Liberty Bridge Inc, will be mobilizing on site with active construction activities beginning this summer. The project involves creating approximately 300 linear feet of asphalt trail improvements and 325 linear feet on an elevated concrete pedestrian crossing over the dam outfall in Lake Accotink Park. Total project costs, inclusive of design, permitting, testing, utilities, construction and administration, is just over \$3 million.

The Lake Accotink Loop Trail system is currently one of the most heavily used trails in the Park Authority, serving communities around Lake Accotink and park visitors throughout the region. The existing pedestrian and vehicular crossing at the outfall of the Lake Accotink dam floods suddenly and frequently, often stranding trail users and tempting them to wade through swiftly running water. Excessive damage due to major storm events has required a total reconstruction of the trail twice in the last five years. This project will resolve these issues, enhancing safety and accessibility for park users.

Project completion is anticipated in early 2023. Residents should expect occasional construction traffic entering and exiting the Accotink Park Road entrance. Portions of the surrounding Lake Accotink Trail will be closed and signs posted during construction.

Car Tax Relief is Coming!

County residents will see a new insert when personal property tax bills are sent out later this month!

As part of the FY 2023 budget mark-up, the Board of Supervisors approved a local 15% tax relief for vehicle owners and lessees. This is nearly \$98 million in financial relief for county residents.

Personal property taxes (car taxes) are based on the assessed value of your vehicle using the JD Power Pricing Guide as of January 1, 2022.

- This year, used vehicle values have sky-rocketed as a result of pandemic supply-chain issues that have severely limited the amount of new vehicles that are able to enter the market for consumers.
- Almost 90% of residents will see an increase in the assessed value of their vehicles.
- With this relief, cars will only be taxed at 85% of their value instead of the usual 100%.

Captain Lieb is an active member of the FCPD Crisis Negotiations Team, trained to assist during mental health crisis, barricade situations and other critical incidents. He has also supervised the FCPD Crime Prevention Program, helping to organize participation in National Night Out and maintaining the Department's Certified Crime Prevention Community (CCPC) designation.

In his spare time, he loves spending time with his wife and two children - a seven year old and a three-year-old. He is also a diehard Pittsburg sports fan – especially the Penguins!



TrailsforYouth.Org Rolling into Outdoor Fun for SCA Families and Youth



How Redistricting Affects You

Those who vote at Crestwood Elementary as your home precinct have been redistricted from the 8th to the 11th Congressional District.

- Because this change becomes official on Jan. 1, 2023, there will NOT be a primary election held at Crestwood on June 21, 2022. There will still be a Democratic primary held the 8th Congressional District, but it no longer includes Crestwood. There will be no primary this year in the 11th District as Democratic incumbent Gerald Connolly is running unopposed and the Republican party selects its candidates through alternative means.
- This redistricting similarly affects much of Lynbrook and Garfield precincts, too!
- In the Virginia Legislature, you will no longer be in Vivian Watts House District 39. You will be included in House District 18, currently represented by Delegate Kathy Tran and Delegate Eileen Filler-Corn.
- You will remain in Dick Saslaw's Virginia Senate 35th District.

Check your local listings. You can view your polling place, precinct, and especially Congressional district information using the Citizens Portal from the Virginia Department of Elections by clicking here.

A mailing will be sent out to all Fairfax County voters with specific new voter information regarding congressional, senatorial, and supervisory districts and polling locations, as applicable. Meanwhile, you will continue to be represented by 8th District incumbent Congressman Don Beyer until the end of 2022.









The History of Springfield

Hello Springfielders! I hope everyone has enjoyed a nice spring and are now looking forward to a wonderful summer season.

With the hot weather approaching and many residents taking advantage of the swimming opportunities in the area, I would like to wish The Springfield Swim Club (now known as The Springfield Swimming and Racket Club) a Happy 67th Anniversary. In the June 1, 1955 edition of The Springfield Independent, it was reported that the pool held its official opening on Saturday May 28th with events starting from 10:30 AM to 12:00 PM including an open house and opening ceremony with the official opening of the pool itself at 1:00 PM. As with many things in those early days of Springfield's development, the pool was a culmination of a lot of effort through planning, fund raising and the building of community support. Crestwood Construction Corporation vice-president, Mr. E. Carl Hengen agreed to sell the approximately 4.8 acres of land "for cost" to The Springfield Swimming Club, Inc. and the land was deeded over on December 1, 1954. So far I have not been able to find any deed information that might show what that "for cost" amount may have been and I can only surmise that the financing was directly between the swim club and Crestwood Construction rather than through a bank or mortgage institution where a land records document was recorded at the court house.

Although my research and archiving of Springfield's early development history will be ongoing, I find that I have sort of run my course as far as coming up with enough information to create really good copy for these articles, so at least for the time being, this will be my last submission. In looking back over the previous submissions, I see that I was able to cover a good deal of the area's post WW2 history but unfortunately a good deal of what I gather gets into important detail - but ones that really don't rise to the level of fleshing out an article.

Over the past nearly two years it has been a wonderful honor and privilege to share some of the information that I have learned about the early development years of Springfield with you through the courtesy and support of the civic association and your Springfield Reporter. If, in the future, I happen across or compile enough information on a particular subject that is "article worthy", then I will surely reach out to your editor and submit it for publication.

In the meantime, I offer you my heartfelt thanks for your interest and I hope that what I have shared will inspire pride in your community's future from knowing more about it's past. If even one person has begun to see the historic significance in Spring-field (versus a cynical viewpoint of it just being "old unimportant DC suburban sprawl") then my work has been worthwhile.
