
#### President's Message—Gail Nittle

### Supervisor Lusk Update

Dear Springfield Civic Association Members,



I'm happy to report that my Board Matter requesting to adopt "Franconia" as the new name of our district was approved. Throughout the three Name Change Town Halls my office organized, I've heard from many of our neighbors that our district invokes images of the Old Gravel Pits, Huntley Meadows, or Laurel Grove School. However, for others, the former district name Lee stood for the most recognizable confederate figure in history, General Robert E Lee.

The majority of those who participated in this year-long process supported changing the name of our district, and the name Franconia was the overwhelming preference for those who participated in the process. Franconia is a name that is synonymous with our community. From Franconia Road, the Franconia Springfield Metro, the Franconia Museum, and the Franconia Governmental Center, the name Franconia has always been central to our identity. It is also a name that memorializes a place and not a person.

Thank you to the hundreds of residents that wrote letters, sent emails, called our office, and participated in our three town halls. I look forward to sharing the next steps in the name change process soon.

Also, it was a pleasure to welcome Fairfax County Chief of Police Kevin to our virtual Franconia District Public Safety Town Hall. Guest panelists included Dr. Noah Fritz, the Director of Crime Control Strategies & Data Analytics, and officers from the Franconia and Mount Vernon District Stations. The focus of the town hall included a discussion on crime trends, specifically in the Franconia District, including an update on FCPD's latest crime prevention activities. Residents also participated in an open question-and-answer segment.

Thank you to the one-hundred and twenty-two residents that attended the Public Safety Town Hall! I was glad to see many familiar faces. I continue to be pleased with Chief Davis and the Fairfax County Police Department's dedication to engaging our community. Lastly, progress continues to be made on two major projects in Springfield. ### Richard Byrd Library News

Greetings from Richard Byrd Library! The next time you visit the branch, don't be surprised when you see a few new faces. New Branch Manager Rebecca LaPlante joined the branch in May, and several other positions were filled over the summer. Please take a moment to say hello!

As of August 14, 2022, all regional and community Fairfax County Public Library (FCPL) branches moved to a modified schedule due to ongoing staff recruitment challenges. This schedule requires only one shift of staff a day, allowing FCPL to maintain all open days at its branches. With this change, Richard Byrd Library's hours of operation are:

Monday: 1 - 9 p.m.

Tuesday - Saturday: 10 a.m. - 6 p.m.

The Fairfax County Health Department offers COVID-19 testing at Richard Byrd Library on Wednesdays and Saturdays from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. through the end of September. Guests can get PCR testing without an appointment at a convenient kiosk located in the library's parking lot. Starting Saturday, September 10th, through October 22nd, all Blue and Yellow line stations south of Reagan National Airport will close to prep for the new Potomac Yard Station. The purpose of the closure is to rehabilitate the Yellow Line tunnel and bridge between Pentagon and L'Enfant Plaza stations



and connect the new Potomac Yard Station to the mainline rail system.

Seven free shuttles will be offered during Phase One, including local and express shuttles in Virginia and three limited-stop shuttles crossing the Potomac River.

- Local shuttles will be available during all Metrorail operating hours.
- Blue Line Local

Local service between Franconia-Springfield, Van Dorn St, King St-Old Town, Braddock Rd, and Ronald Reagan Washington National Airport stations every 10-20 minutes

Yellow Line Local

Local service between Huntington, Eisenhower Ave, King St-Old Town, Braddock Rd, and Crystal City stations every 10-15 minutes. Yellow Line shuttles do not stop at Ronald Reagan Washington National Airport Station.





#### **Book Review:** The Dictionary of Lost Words

by Claudia Moore



We know that stories are made of words, but do we think about the stories of the words themselves? In *The Dictionary of Lost Words* by Pip Williams, Esme does indeed think about the stories of the words in the early days of the 20th century. She grows up at her father's feet -- literally under the table in the scriptorium (official workroom) waiting for slips of paper listing words being discussed but dropped from consideration for the new Oxford English Dictionary. He is a professor and lexicographer hired to work on this new, thorough history and presentation of the evolution of the words in the English language. Words were suggested from around the world from educated volunteers. She sets aside some of the dropped words dismissed by the male editors as being termed vulgar and unimportant (too feminine). Later she goes out and interviews the street folk looking for words to add. Since she was raised in a prim and proper home of the 1800's, these scenes are delightfully comedic. Esme grows up and adds to this dignified volume. She develops a strong interest in suffrage and women's rights in this turbulent time. Based on true people and events (the word *bondmaid* was omitted from the original OED) this entertaining novel presents a part of our history that we take for granted but should not.

#### **Book Review:** Home Before Dark

If you love horror, mystery and adventure books, *Home Before Dark* by Riley Sager might be the perfect chilling read for you this summer.

We've all heard that creak in the wood or that strange noise in the basement and thought, what is that? Am I haunted? Maggie Holt is no stranger to strange noises and haunted homes. Years ago, when her family spent several weeks at the famous Baneberry Hall house, it changed her life forever. They didn't last more than three weeks before fleeing in the middle of the night. As an adult she never thought she'd be back at the infamous haunted house--thanks to her father and his bestselling book. Can Maggie survive a summer there as she plans to renovate and sell the house? Or will she flee just as her parents did all those years ago. Fans of Ruth Ware will love this gripping horror story. Make sure you don't read it in the dark! And if you enjoy listening to books, it's even better when you download it on the Libby app as an audiobook!.

#### The Woman's Club of Springfield





### ECHO—Changes in Food Distribution Methods



The need for food assistance in our community continues as one of ECHO's great challenges. Our volunteers have worked hard to redesign food distribution methods to allow for choice. Instead of handing out pre-packed bags of non-perishables that are the same for every household, clients are now able to choose foods that reflect their dietary needs. ECHO believes there is less waste and greater accommodation for health, religious and cultural needs. In making this change, ECHO has found that our list of most needed foods has changed. In addition to all varieties of personal care products such as toothpaste and deodorant, our list includes nuts, dried fruits, dried beans, honey, lentils, tomato paste, sugar, coffee (including instant), canned fish and maseca flour.

We are grateful for the donors who will help us make these important changes, and perhaps take advantage of a **Shred and Share** event at Burke Presbyterian Church, 5690 Oak Leather Drive, Burke, on Saturday, September 17, 9:00 am to noon. Shelley Draheim, Realtor, has arranged for a shred truck to have documents securely destroyed for free. Volunteers will be collecting non-perishable food donations for ECHO at this event.

### Outdoor Storage Regulations

Are there storage restrictions? Many of us have more "stuff" than places to put it, or want to keep materials and machines in our yards. However, to maintain a pleasant appearance in our neighborhoods in Fairfax County, outdoor storage is not permitted in any front yard, nor is it permitted to exceed 100 sq. ft. anywhere on your property, including the back yard.

What if I am in the process of building? There is an exception for residences undergoing construction or improvements as long as there is a valid building permit and work is in progress.

What if I am not in compliance? If a property is reported to the Department of Code Compliance (DCC), inspectors will come out to determine if a violation is taking place and then contact the property owner. There are several steps for remediation, but if a property is not brought up to code, a civil action and a court order could be imposed.

What if I see a property possibly out of compliance? You can contact the DCC at 703-324-1300 or fill out the online form



### On the Verge

Is there a sidewalk that runs in front of your home? Is there grass between that sidewalk and the road? According to Wikipedia, that strip of grass is called a "road verge" but there are numerous regional terms for it as well. In Virginia, Maryland, Indiana and Tennessee, it is known as a "sidewalk plot".

Have you ever wondered who owns that strip of grass? The land is often public property, with maintenance usually being a municipal responsibility. Some municipal authorities, however, require that abutting property owners maintain their respective verge areas. That is the case in Fairfax County. Sidewalk maintenance is done by VDOT but the homeowner maintains that sidewalk plot as they do the rest of their lawn.



Other terms for these grassy areas include Besidewalk, Curb Lawn, Curb Strip, Devil Strip, Extension Lawn, Grass Bay, Hellstrip, Sidewalk Lawn, and Swale. Aren't you glad we live in Virginia?

### Trash Company Consent Agreement and Potential New Service Model

The County is taking steps to address the ongoing trash service issues that many residents continue to face, especially those serviced by American Disposal. As they did back in 2018, the County is currently negotiating a consent agreement with American to address the breakdown in their operations that are resulting in repeatedly missed pickups. The last time the County did a consent agreement with American at the request of two Board of Supervisor members, many of the service issues cleared up. It is hoped that once this enforcement action/agreement is finalized it will resolve many of the issues residents are experiencing.

In addition to working to resolve the issues with American, County staff is in the early stages of developing a model that will allow residents to petition to receive contracted service as part of a sanitary district. Currently, residents can petition to be a sanitary district that, if approved by the Board, would be serviced by the County hauler. Due to the current labor and supply constraints on all trash haulers, including the County, County staff are temporarily not recommending that the Board approve new sanitary districts.

Under the model being developed, the Board could approve new sanitary districts that would then be serviced by a private hauler contracted by the County. This model would strengthen accountability for haulers to provide agreed to service levels or risk losing their contract. It would also help haulers operate more efficiently, serving entire areas instead of one-off homes which currently stretch their operational capabilities. The new model is not perfect, but the current system is inefficient and therefore expensive. While residents currently get to choose their provider, unless they are part of an HOA, they have little leverage with the provider. This model should result in better service for contracted areas, providing benefits for both haulers and residents – including fewer trash trucks running through neighborhoods.

Many have suggested the county franchise trash service as Arlington has done. Due to current state regulations, as well as time and cost constraints, a direct franchising model is not currently feasible for Fairfax County. That is why the alternative solution is being explored.

County staff continues to work with the private haulers to address the issues raised by our residents. #### **Attend Today, Achieve Tomorrow!**

The beginning of the school year is the best time to develop strong attendance habits! Students who attend school regularly are more likely to perform well in reading and math, develop strong social and emotional skills, and graduate from high school on time. #### **Safety Drills During the School Year**

Keeping students and staff safe is a priority for all of us. Each school has an emergency preparedness plan to respond to incidents such as fires and tornadoes. Schools are required by state law to practice emergency drills, including lockdown drills, each year. Schools are required to notify parents and guardians at least 24 hours before a school conducts a lockdown drill. However, schools are not required to give the specific date and time of the drill in advance.

The first lockdown drill of the school year must take place within the first 20 days of school. Preschool and kindergarten students are exempt from practicing the first lockdown drill.

Your child may come home and talk about their experience during the drill. We encourage you to talk with your child about the importance of being prepared for emergencies. Here are some helpful tips for families to use to support their students before and after school lockdown drills.

Working together, we create a safe, secure environment for students to learn and grow in our schools.

#### **Attendance Matters**

In Virginia, students enrolled in public schools are required to attend school regularly, regardless of the type of instruction offered. Our students need to be present, engaged, and supported as they return for the 2021-22 school year.

Attendance Reminders:


- FCPS must record student attendance every school day.
- Parents should report their student's absences to school any day students are unable to participate in learning. They may report the absences by calling the school attendance line or emailing the school-designated attendance address.
- When parents do not report their students' absences, teachers and school personnel will call to identify the student's absence reasons.


